Council Member Terry Davis stated the current ISO rating for the Fire Department is a 4.

Council Member Terry Davis stated the City must have permission from all property owners for the demolition of dilapidated houses.

Mayor Woodbury stated PDRTA has more buses running in the County and this will enhance the growth of the City of Mullins.

Council Member Kindra Brewton-Pompey stated she will be having a Easter Egg hunt on Saturday, April 8th in Mary Louis Rutland Park from 12:00 – 3:00 PM. Entertainment and vendors will be at the event.

Council Member Kitchen stated Police Committee meetings were held this past month. The priority is to keep citizens safe. Two (2) officers have graduated from the Academy.

Mayor Pro Tem Carolyn Wilson recognized Recreation Director Allen Floyd. Floyd state over 100 kids are signed up for baseball this year. Two (2) new employees have been hired (Tim Felder & Jermaine Paige). Charles White has also been hired for part-time maintenance. Floyd asked to be excused.

Mayor Pro Tem Carolyn Wilson stated Street/Sanitation Director Tarus Gilchrist suggested the City purchase a second garbage truck. The purpose is for a back-up in case one truck breaks down. The street sweeper runs five (5) days a week. Mayor Woodbury stated street employees need a valid driver's license.

Edible trees are being planted at the garden on Smith and Front Street. The garden on West Marion Street is a memorial garden with seedlings in the greenhouse.

Mr. Hardnett stated Planning Day is April 5th.

Mrs. Miko Pickett noted the new officer walking around town. Pickett stated the Eat Local Pee Dee has processed their first cow. Pick 42 is partnering with local churches for distribution of the foods. Orders are place on Tuesday with delivery on Wednesday and distribution on Thursday's. The areas for distribution include: Marion, Dillon, and Marlboro counties. This Thursday's menu is beef at 11:00AM.
