OPTIONAL PUBLIC HEARING MINUTES

The Mullins City Council held an Optional Public Hearing on Tuesday, April 14, 2026, at 5:00pm in the Raymond Pridgen Auditorium, Mullins City Hall, Mullins, South Carolina. **1. CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Pro Tem Carolyn Wilson called the City Council Meeting to order at 5:00 PM at the Raymond Pridgen Auditorium.
